Encounters with Christ

JESUS AND A FRIGHTENED MAN

PETER (*MATTHEW 14:22-33*)

SUMMARY Through this frightening experience of the storm on the sea of Galilee, Jesus taught his disciples how to overcome fear and other adversities, through faith.

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

- 1. Why were Peter and the other disciples frightened? (vv.24,26) How had Jesus' absence affected them?
- 2. What are the "storms" that make **us** afraid in our daily lives?
- 3. What did Jesus do to calm their fear? (vv.25-27)
- What important lessons did Peter learn about faith, doubt, failure and salvation? How would he have **felt** at each stage of this adventure? (vv.28-32)

APPLICATION

What can we learn from these points about how Jesus can free us from our fears?

GUIDELINES TO ANSWERS

- 1. Sudden storm. Jesus was not with them. When he appeared, they thought he was a ghost; fear of the supernatural. Feeling abandoned, they were more afraid and insecure.
- 2. Sudden illness; matrimonial, family and economic crises; accidents; violent changes in the political arena, in our work or circumstances: loss of loved ones; upsets in our home, temptations, etc.
- 3. He came to them in their fear, he spoke and encouraged them. Through Peter, he showed how they could have victory over fear through faith, stepping out on his word.
- 4. He must keep his eyes on Jesus, not on the difficulties. Even if he failed, he could still trust Jesus to save and help him.

APPLICATION

When Jesus enters our life, we experience **faith** in the midst of the most difficult circumstances; He gives us his peace, and helps lift us up again when we fail or fall. (You can use the Leaflet "How can I get to know God?" on pages 69, 70)

EXPLANATORY NOTES

(v.24) "Battered by the waves" - Even today, sudden violent storms are very common on the sea of Galilee. Fishermen fear these storms because they are so sudden and unpredictable.

NURTURE

How to be Jesus' disciples

THE BIBLE (2 TIMOTHY 3:14-17)

SUMMARY Paul instructs Timothy, the pastor in the church, to continue to read the Scriptures that he has known since he was a child, so that he may be well qualified and equipped for right living and for Christian ministry.

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

- 1. In these verses, what advice does Paul give to Timothy to strengthen him in his life and Christian ministry?
- 2. For what are the Holy Scriptures useful? (vv.15,16,17)
- 3. Why do we call the Scriptures "The Word of God"? (v.16 - see also 2 Peter 1:21)

APPLICATION

How can we establish a habit of regularly reading the Scriptures?

<u>NOTE:</u> This study is lengthened by a Special Bible Meditation (see **APPLICATION** on the following page).

GUIDELINES TO ANSWERS

- 1. He should continue (*persevere*) in the true teaching of the Scriptures; he should read it, understand it and apply it to his own life.
- For a person to find salvation in Christ. To teach us, to uncover the secrets of our hearts, to correct our errors, to instruct us in God's ways. If we read and obey the Scriptures we shall become "men of God", well qualified and equipped.
- 3. The Bible was "inspired by God". In other words God caused it to be written by men of God. (Take time to flick through the pages of the Bible to *show* them both the Old and New Testaments).

APPLICATION

Emphasize the need to have a **daily habit** of reading the Bible. Advise where to start - Mark or John - how much to read and where to continue reading. Advise them to set a daily **time** and **place**, for this. Explain how to **pray, read, apply and pray again**, as they read. Have a short Bible meditation on Matthew 7:24-29 to **show how** to do this.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

- * (v.15) "ever since you were a child" Read 2 Timothy 1:5.
- * (v.15) "The Holy Scriptures" In those days it only consisted of the Old Testament, the Jewish Scriptures. During the *first years* of the church they started to use the Gospels and Paul's letters as "Scriptures" also (see 2 Peter 3:15,16); that is how the New Testament was soon added.
